PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES
November 16, 2022 - 4:00 P.M.
City Hall Conference Room

CALL TO ORDER:

A meeting of the City of Clarksville Public Safety Committee was called to order by Councilperson Travis Holleman on Wednesday, November 16, 2022, at 4:01pm.

ATTENDANCE:

It was noted by Councilperson Holleman that there was a quorum.

Councilperson Travis Holleman (Chair), Councilperson Vondell Richmond, Councilperson Karen Reynolds

Others Participating: Building & Codes Director David Smith, Fire & Rescue Chief Freddie Montgomery, Chief of Police David Crockarell, Internal Auditor Stephanie Fox, and Building & Codes Administrative Supervisor Deidre Ward

ADOPTION OF MINUTES:

The committee unanimously voted to approve the minutes from the September 21, 2022 and the October 19, 2022 meeting with a motion to approve made by Councilperson Richmond and seconded by Councilperson Reynolds.

BUILDING & CODES DEPARTMENT:

- David Smith spoke on behalf of Building and Codes.
 - Mr. Smith reviewed the previously submitted monthly report.
 - Mr. Smith started a discussion on upcoming PUD projects. He is an advocate for PUD's. He discussed the issues regarding the actual plans that are being approved vs. what is actually being built. He has asked the committee to take a close look when the PUD's come forth.

- Councilperson Reynolds added her opinion on the PUD's. She is an advocate for seeing the building plans in writing.
- Councilperson Richmond questioned the infrastructure processes within Clarksville. Councilperson Reynolds noted the massive amount of complaints received regarding Clarksville's infrastructure. Mr. Smith addressed these concerns, while also noting that Needmore Rd., Trenton Rd., and Rossview Rd. are not the responsibility of the city but of the state.

POLICE DEPARTMENT:

- Chief David Crockarell spoke on behalf of the Police Department.
 - He reviewed the previously submitted monthly report.
 - CPD is down 35 sworn police officers.
 - CPD has been awarded a 2 year federal grant for a new position: Internal Wellness Counselor. The counselor will assist CPD and their families. After the 2 year grant, the costs will be absorbed in salaries. Chief Crockarell is hoping, after the 2 years, that the city absorbs the cost and this is opened to other employees. He believes this will grow to benefit all city employees at some point.
 - Councilperson Reynolds questioned where the counselor will be housed. Chief Crockarell addressed her concerns, noting the benefit of the counselor being offsite.

FIRE & RESCUE DEPARTMENT:

- Chief Freddie Montgomery spoke on behalf of the Fire & Rescue Department.
 - He reviewed the previously submitted monthly report.
 - CFR has 14 recruits in training. They are currently in week three of a four week training. CFR will be fully staffed once their training has been completed.
 - Chief Montgomery thanked the committee for their approval of the new admin building, which is currently out for bid. The old building has been demolished. Two mobile trailers have been ordered to operate out of and should arrive within three weeks. They will work out of the trailers for about a year until the new building has been built.
 - Chief Montgomery mentioned they are still experiencing supply chain issues. There are five vehicles currently on backorder. Their tower is twenty years old and normal replacement is fifteen years. He thanked the committee for their support.

A motion to adjourn was made by Councilperson Richmond and seconded by Councilperson Reynolds. The motion passed and the meeting adjourned at 4:29pm.

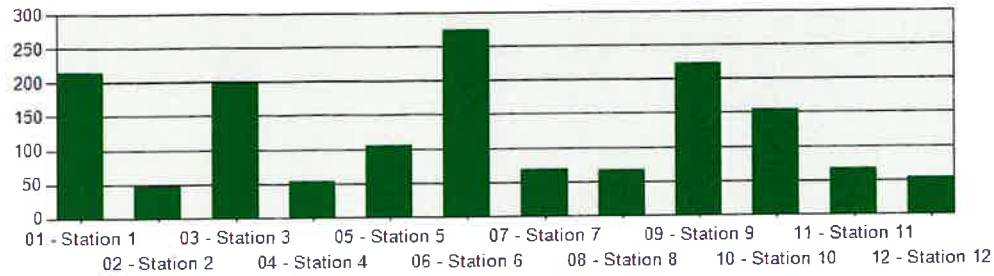

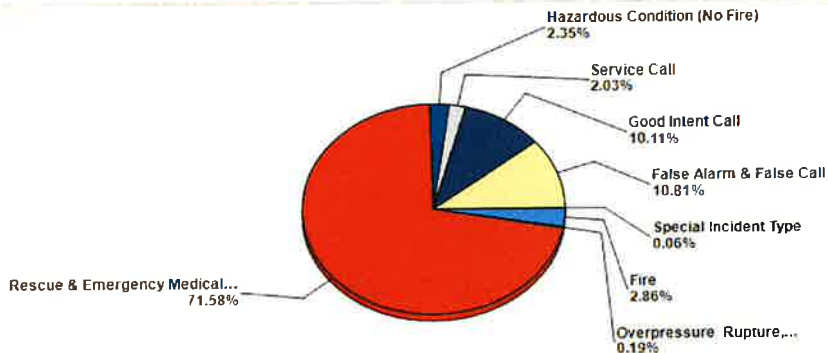

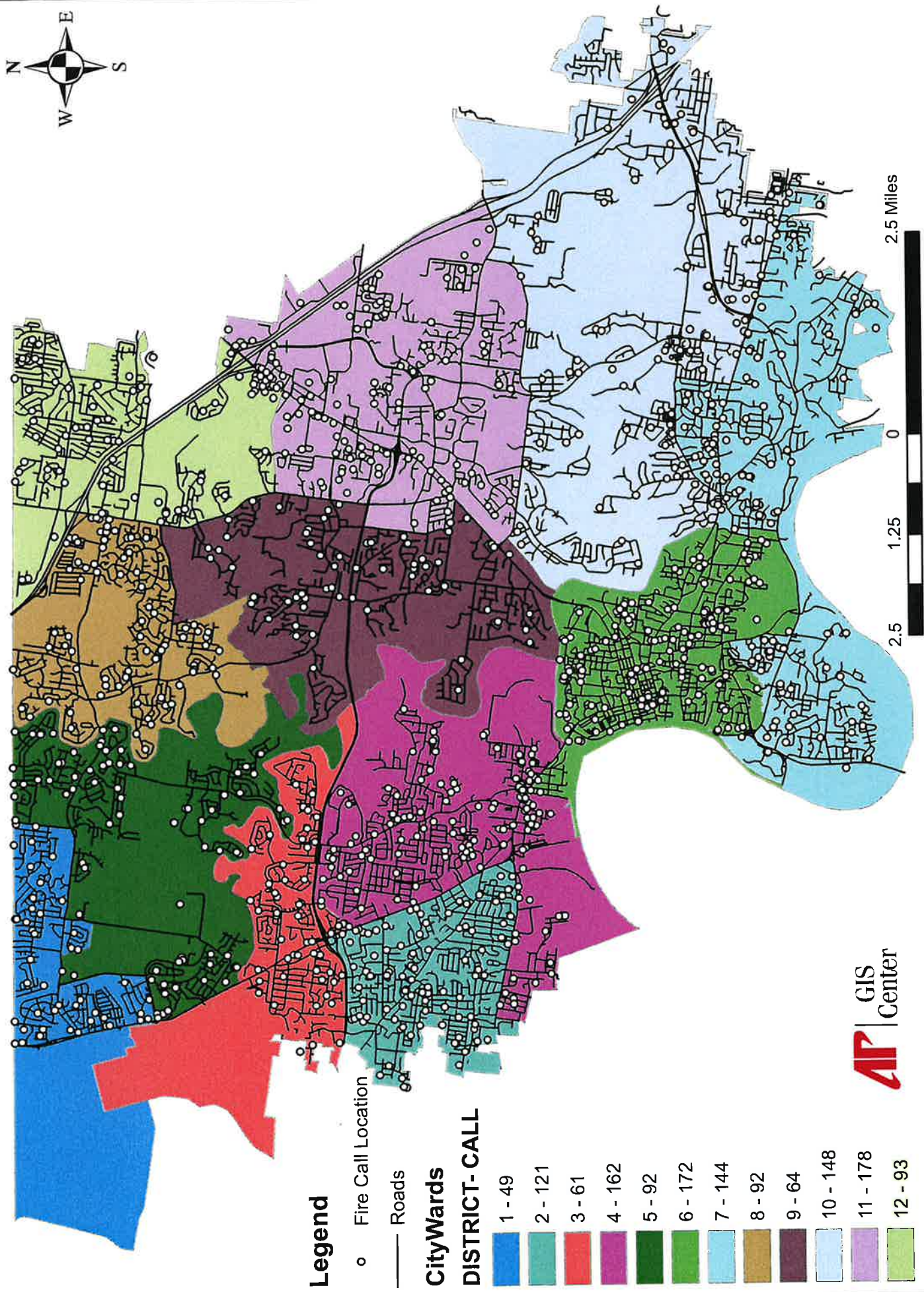

RESOLUTION 42-2022-23

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING RETIREMENT OF A PATROL SERVICE DOG “VADER” FROM K-9 UNIT AND DONATION TO POLICE OFFICER CASEY STANTON;

WHEREAS, the Clarksville Police Department (CPD) has previously established a K-9 Unit; and

WHEREAS, the CPD K-9 Unit consists of certain Officers of the Clarksville Police Department and patrol service dogs; and

WHEREAS, the CPD K-9 Unit purchased a patrol service dog named “Vader” approximately five years ago; and

WHEREAS, “Vader” has several problems that will affect the rest of his career in law enforcement, to include signs of tooth wear, osteoarthritis, clouding of the eyes, slowed or labored movement, and weight gain. Because of his condition, he is no longer able to perform the duties of a patrol service dog; and

WHEREAS, “Vader” should be retired from police work due to the aforesaid problems, as recommended by Cynthia Miller, DVM, St. Bethlehem Animal Clinic; and

WHEREAS, the long-term outlook or prospects for “Vader” if he were to be sold by the City for fair market value appear dubious, with little return likely for the City; and

WHEREAS, the fair market value for replacing a police service dog is approximately \$7,000.00; and

WHEREAS, “Vader” has rendered faithful performance and conducted himself in a most exemplary manner while serving as a member of the CPD K-9 Unit; and

WHEREAS, the main handler for “Vader” is CPD Officer Casey Stanton, who has agreed to accept the donation of Vader and provide him with care and necessary upkeep, and release the City of Clarksville of all liability; and

WHEREAS, the Clarksville City Council is of the considered opinion that donation of Vader to his main CPD Officer handler is in the best interest of all parties concerned;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE, TENENSSEE:

That the Clarksville City Council hereby authorizes the Clarksville Police Department to retire a K-9 known as “Vader” from the K-9 Unit and donate same to his main handler, a CPD Officer.

RESOLUTION No. 43-2022-23

A RESOLUTION EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR A "LICENSE PLATE READER"
EQUIPMENT ACQUISITION AND PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Clarksville Police Department has received a grant from the State of Tennessee to acquire license plate reader equipment, and to implement a program using this vital law enforcement tool; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that use of license plate reader equipment by CPD will aid in the reduction of crime generally, lessen the chances of victimization of citizens and visitors, and speed the process of locating missing and abducted victims; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE, TENNESSEE:

That the Clarksville City Council supports the Clarksville Police Department's acquisition of license plate reader equipment using State grant funds, and the implementation of a program to use such equipment by CPD in order to reduce crime, victimization, and to more speedily locate missing and abducted persons, and commits to sustaining this longterm program after initial state funding expires.
