PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

January 15, 2020 - 4:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Chairman Henley and it was noted there was a quorum.

Minutes from the December 18, 2019 meeting were approved by the committee after a motion was made by Councilman Holleman and seconded by Councilwoman Smith.

BUILDING & CODES:

~Mr. Smith stated that he would answer any questions regarding the monthly reports.

- He noted that 2019 commercial permits were down, as compared to 2017 and 2018. However, multi-family and single family permits were very high in 2019, compared to 2017 and 2018. Revenues generated were consistent in 2017 and 2018 at 1.9 million, and are showing an increase so far this year.
- He stated that Councilman Erb had relayed a concern from a constituent regarding lack of self-initiated complaints in Ward 3. The report identifies both citizen complaints and self-initiated complaints which are about equal in number. Approximately one third are in Ward 3.
- Chairman Henley asked why commercial permits were down and Mr. Smith said they were down, but sometimes the scale of the projects can skew the total number.
- Chairman Henley asked about rules on placement of campaign signs. Mr. Smith said the former RPC Director had started looking into this with the Legal Department before he left, but no changes got completed. 4 x 4 signs are permitted with no fee, but anything larger requires a permit fee of \$25 per location. Councilwoman Smith said she feels that since the candidate and the property owner both pay taxes, that this is a duplication and is unfair. Mr. Smith said the current law must be complied with by the Codes Dept. He stated that they have to monitor the signs to make sure candidates are in compliance, which is very time consuming.
- Councilwoman Smith asked how many codes enforcement officers they currently have and Mr. Smith said six, down one from seven.

POLICE DEPARTMENT:

~Chief Ansley presented monthly reports and asked for questions.
He introduced Deputy Chief David Crockarell.

FIRE DEPARTMENT:

~Chief Montgomery gave a review of the monthly reports and asked for questions.

- He stated that during 2019 they made 14,649 runs, conducted over 2,500 commercial fire inspections, and their fire fighters received over 37,000 total training hours. During December, they conducted 165 runs, issued 7 commercial burn permits, installed 60 smoke detectors, attended five public education events, reviewed 17 plans, and conducted 11 investigations. They are short five staff members and will add four more by March with retirements coming up. Promotions for all ranks are underway. They will be educating the public in the next few days about burn permit procedures and will give out the phone number to call for information.
- Mentioned issues with roof leaks at Station 1 and with gas issues at Station 6 stemming from the construction of the building. David Smith stated that it is not an emergency, but repairs are underway.
- He introduced Gina Johnson, who was recently selected to replace Susan Harris when she retired.

CITY COUNCIL ACTION REQUIRED

Ordinance 49-2019-20: An Ordinance to amend the City Code pertaining to a prohibition on electric motorized bicycles, scooters, and skateboards. (Councilman Holleman)

Councilman Holleman asked for the committee's thoughts on amending this Ordinance, as to whether we should ban or regulate scooters. Mayor Pitts said he has concerns about scooters on narrow streets and sidewalks, but feels they may be a good alternative source of transportation, especially when the convention center is completed. He is leaning toward banning them. Mr. Tyndall said they might be positive as a link between downtown and APSU. Nashville and Memphis partner with multiple companies and it might be best to partner with only one company. He favors giving it a try. Councilman Richmond said his biggest concern would be liability to the City. He has witnessed lots of disasters in another city. Councilman Holleman said they issue DUI tickets in Knoxville. Councilwoman Streetman said she has researched other cities as this matter first came before the Parks & Recreation Committee. Some require a license for each scooter, in addition to a business license. She fears they will clutter the sidewalks and could be dangerous in light of the uneven sidewalks. She favors a ban because of the liability factor. Those she has talked to are also against them. Chief Ansley said he also favors a ban. Birmingham discontinued theirs and Nashville has a lot less than they used to. Councilwoman Smith asked about revenue for the City and the Mayor answered that there would be no revenue sharing. She said our downtown is too small to accommodate them and there could be liability issues especially concerning minors. She favors banning them also. Councilman Henley suggested having a trial period. Mayor Pitts said that Lance Baker met with the County to discuss and is reviewing other cities so we may want to wait and get this opinion and get a temporary ban in the meantime. Councilman Richmond said he would like to know if APSU is in favor and Councilwoman Streetman said those she has spoken with at APSU are not in favor of them. Chairman Henley asked if we should postpone for six months or a year and the Mayor suggested six months. Councilwoman Smith made a motion to postpone for six months in order to get more feedback from Lance Baker. Councilman Holleman seconded the motion and it was approved by all.

Ordinance 54-2019-20: An Ordinance amending Part II of the City of Clarksville Code of Ordinances, Title 4 (Building, Utility and Housing Codes), Chapter 5 (Plumbing Code), relative to residential new construction plumbing permit fee. (David Smith)

Mr. Smith stated that this change was presented by the Plumbing Board and is designed to create a more uniform way to handle the fee structure for new residential construction plumbing permits. The current fee in the City is \$10 per opening, and a flat fee of \$140 in the County, This Ordinance would change the City fee to a flat fee of \$140, the same as the County rate. Motion was made by Councilman Holleman to approve this Ordinance, seconded by Councilman Richmond, and approved by all.

Resolution 39-2019-20: A Resolution authorizing retirement of a Patrol Service Dog "Leonidas" from K-9 Unit and donation to Police Officer Gary Mefford. (Chief Ansley)

Chief Ansley stated that the K-9 Unit does a great job and has grown from one dog to six during his tenure. Patrol Service Dog Leonidas is nine years old and has a severe spinal condition, along with other medical problems, preventing him from performing duties of a Patrol Service Dog. He is asking that Leonidas be retired and donated to his handler, Officer Gary Mefford. The Resolution was approved by all after motion was made by Councilman Richmond and seconded by Councilwoman Smith.

Approval of Memorandum of Understanding between Austin Peay State University and City of Clarksville, Tennessee Police Department (Chief Ansley)

Chief Ansley stated that the Memorandum of Understanding establishes permission for APSU to use the Police Department radio channels to enhance communication. They will purchase their own equipment. He added that Mayor Pitts is in favor of the agreement. Councilman Richmond made a motion to approve the MOU, seconded by Councilwoman Smith, and approved by all.

There was no further business.

Councilman Richmond made a motion to adjourn at 4:52 p.m. and Councilwoman Smith seconded the motion.

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m. by Chairman Henley and it was noted there was a quorum.

APPROVAL TO INCREASE COURT COST

Mr. Stauffer stated that a local law went into effect in 2015 providing that a five dollar (\$5.00) fee be assessed for each traffic citation resulting in a conviction. One dollar (\$1.00) was retained by the Court Clerk and used for computer purchases and related expenses, and four dollars (\$4.00) was transmitted monthly to a special revenue fund of the Police Department to be used for electronic citations system and technology related expenses. Ms. Matta stated that this is a restricted fund and funds remain there and roll over from year to year. Mr. Stauffer said that this law would expire on February 9, 2020, at midnight. Mr. Stauffer stated that the purpose of this meeting is to approve a written motion (attached) to increase court costs by \$5.00 pursuant to City Code Sec. 1-907.

A motion was made by Councilwoman. Smith, seconded by Councilman Holleman, and approved by all committee members to approve such five dollar (\$5.00) increase in court costs.

Councilwoman Smith made a motion to adjourn at 4:03 p.m. and Councilman Richmond seconded the motion.

MOTION TO INCREASE CITY COURT COSTS

Clarksville City Code § 1-907 provides that the Public Safety Committee shall fix such court costs from time to time to be paid in City Court and that such amounts shall be in the discretion of the Committee. Court costs may be increased or decreased as the Committee deems to be in the best interests of the City.

THEREFORE, Pursuant to City Code § 1-907, the Chairman of the Public Safety Committee moves as follows:

- (1) That City Court costs be increased by five dollars (\$5.00) for each traffic citation resulting in a plea of guilty or nolo contendere, or a judgment of guilty.
- (2) That one dollar (\$1.00) of such increased court costs shall be retained by the Court Clerk in a special revenue fund to be used for the following purposes:
 - a. Computer hardware purchases, usual and necessary computer related expenses, or replacement.
- (3) That four dollars (\$4.00) of such increased court costs shall be transmitted monthly by the Court Clerk to a special revenue fund of the Clarksville Police Department to be used for the following purposes:
 - a. Electronic citation system and program-related expenditures; and
 - b. Related expenditures for technology, equipment, repairs, replacement, and training to maintain electronic citation programs.
- (4) That such funds shall be preserved for the aforementioned designated purposes and shall not revert to the general fund at the end of each budget year if unexpended.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A TEMPORARY PROHIBITION OR MORATORIUM ON ELECTRIC MOTORIZED BICYCLES, SCOOTERS, AND SKATEBOARDS

WHEREAS, the state law private act Charter of the City of Clarksville, at Article I, Section 4, and Section 5, sub-sections (19), (26), (28), (34), (35), (53), and (57) provides authority to the City to provide for and to protect public health, safety, and general welfare, and to regulate motorized vehicles, streets, alleys, trails, parks, and sidewalks, *inter alia*; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that recent transportation and technology innovations have led to new mobility options for people and have created a new market for both privately owned, and commercial on-demand, shared, dockless, small vehicles and vehicle systems, which may include, but is not limited to, electric motorized bicycles, scooters, and / or skateboards; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that although this new low-emission transportation technology platform offers some benefits to the public, the use of this new transportation technology often results in shared dock-less small vehicles being placed, dropped off, and left unattended, virtually anywhere in the public right-of-way, to include on or along public streets, parks, and sidewalks, in a haphazard, dangerous, chaotic, and unsafe manner for pedestrians, motorists, and other small vehicle users, and the operator themselves; and

WHEREAS, the City Council further finds that the use of said shared dock-less small vehicles wherein said vehicles are placed, dropped off, and left unattended can impede both vehicular and pedestrian traffic, to include the traversing of City streets and sidewalks by persons with disabilities sometimes even making them inaccessible, and creates generally a tripping, stumbling hazard and nuisance to the public, and the potential for motor vehicle / pedestrian accidents and / or property damage from careless or negligent use or placement of said vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the City Council further finds that the use of said shared dock-less small vehicles wherein said vehicles are placed, dropped off, and left unattended can impede commercial foot traffic to local merchants, stores, restaurants, and entertainment venues by generally blocking access and egress, and creating blockages along sidewalks and at doorways; and

WHEREAS, the City Council further finds that when said vehicles are placed, dropped off, and left unattended the effect is to create a cluttered environment and an unappealing aesthetic look; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that numerous other cities who have had extensive experience with said vehicles and vehicle systems and the regulation of same have encountered numerous safety problems and regulatory enforcement problems, to include several cities in Tennessee such as Nashville and Chattanooga; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the detriments and costs to the City and the public **appear to** outweigh any potential benefits from the use of such vehicles and vehicle systems, and

that the use and / or operation of such vehicles and / or vehicle systems, or the rental of, or offering to rent, such vehicles and / or vehicle systems, should be prohibited temporarily on and along City public streets, roads, alleys, right-of-ways, or sidewalks within the Central Business District as established, and as may be amended from time to time, in the City zoning code, and on and along all arterial or collector roads as listed in Appendix H (Access Regulations) of the City Code and all public sidewalks running along said roads, and in all City owned parks, and the City owned Clarksville Greenway trail system, for a period of approximately six (6) months, until and including September 3, 2020 (the scheduled date for the City Council regular voting session for September), in order to allow the City / City Council more time to gather information and to study the possible deleterious effects of electric motorized scooters.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE, TENNESSEE:

1. That an ordinance providing for a temporary prohibition or moratorium on electric motorized scooters is hereby established as follows:

Electric Motorized Bicycles, Scooters, and Skateboards.

Section 1. Definitions.

For purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings set forth below:

- a. *"Dockless Small Vehicle System"* shall mean a system or equipment which provides electric motor powered bicycles or scooters, and / or electric or gasoline motor powered skateboards, or similar types of small electrically powered or partially powered vehicles for public use, to include for short-term rentals, which may be locked and unlocked without the requirement of a bicycle rack or other docking station, designed for shared use utilizing the Global Positioning System (GPS) or other similar technology.
- b. *"Dockless Small Vehicle"* shall mean an electric motorized bicycle or scooter, or electric or gas motorized skateboard, or other similar type of small electrically powered or partially powered vehicle which may be locked and unlocked without the requirement of a bicycle rack or other docking station, designed for shared use utilizing the Global Positioning System (GPS) or similar technology, but shall not include a motorized wheelchair, or other personal mobility device designed for and used by a disabled person.
- c. *"Electric Motorized Bicycle"* shall mean two- or three wheeled small vehicle that has handlebars, and a seat for the rider, that is powered by an electric motor either wholly or in conjunction with human power, but shall not include a motorized wheelchair, or other personal mobility device designed for and used by a disabled person.

- d. *“Electric Motorized Scooter”* shall mean any two- or three-wheeled small vehicle that has handlebars, and a floorboard or deck designed to be stood upon while being ridden or used as a mode of transportation, that is powered by an electric motor either wholly or in conjunction with human power, but shall not include a motorized wheelchair, or other personal mobility device designed for and used by a disabled person.
- e. *“Electric or Gas Motorized Skateboard”* shall mean a self-propelled small vehicle or platform device that has at least two tandem wheels that has a floorboard or deck designed to be stood upon while being ridden or used as a mode of transportation, that is powered by a electric or gasoline operated motor, but shall not include a motorized wheelchair, or other personal mobility device designed for and used by a disabled person.

Section 2. Dockless Small Vehicles and Vehicle Systems Use Prohibited.

- a. It shall be unlawful to provide, or to offer for use or rent, or to rent, a Dockless Small Vehicle, either standing alone, or in connection with, or as a part of, a Dockless Small Vehicle System, on and along City public streets, roads, alleys, right-of-ways, or sidewalks within the Central Business District as established, and as may be amended from time to time, in the City zoning code, and on and along all arterial or collector roads as listed in Appendix H (Access Regulations) of the City Code and on all public sidewalks running along said roads, and in all City owned parks, and the City owned Clarksville Greenway trail system.
- b. It shall be unlawful to park, leave standing, leave lying, or to abandon, or to otherwise place or locate a Dockless Small Vehicle on and along City public streets, roads, alleys, right-of-ways, or sidewalks within the Central Business District as established, and as may be amended from time to time, in the City zoning code, and on and along all arterial or collector roads as listed in Appendix H (Access Regulations) of the City Code and on all public sidewalks running along said roads, and in all City owned parks, and the City owned Clarksville Greenway trail system.
- c. It shall be unlawful to use or operate any Dockless Small Vehicle on and along City public streets, roads, alleys, right-of-ways, or sidewalks within the Central Business District as established, and as may be amended from time to time, in the City zoning code, and on and along all arterial or collector roads as listed in Appendix H (Access Regulations) of the City Code and on all public sidewalks running along said roads, and in all City owned parks, and the City owned Clarksville Greenway trail system.

Section 3. Citation to City Court; Civil Fine for Violation; Impoundment.

- a. Any City law enforcement office, ~~and /-or any City Parking Commission agent,~~ is hereby empowered to issue a citation to any person or business entity for any violation of any of the provisions of this chapter. Citations so issued may be delivered in person to the alleged violator, or the citation may be delivered by registered mail to ~~the~~ person so charged if they cannot be readily found, or to the registered agent for any business entity. Any citation so delivered or mailed shall direct the alleged violator to appear in City

Court on a specific day and at a specific hour stated upon the citation; and the time so specified shall be not less than seventy-two (72) hours after its delivery in person to the alleged violator, or less than ten (10) calendar days of mailing same. Citations issued for violations of any provisions of this chapter shall be tried in the City Court. The City Court Judge shall determine whether the City has proven by a preponderance of the evidence that the alleged violator has in fact committed the alleged violation, and if so, the City Court Judge shall impose a civil monetary fine ~~as penalty~~ against any person or business entity found to have violated any provision of this Chapter, said fine not to exceed FIFTY DOLLARS AND ZERO CENTS (\$50.00) for each violation. Each day of violation, and each incident involving a separate Dockless Small Vehicle, shall be deemed a separate and distinct violation.

2. This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the City of Clarksville state law private act Charter and state law of general application. If any section, sub-section, or sub-part, sentence, clause, or phrase is declared invalid or otherwise void by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect any remaining provision hereof. In this regard the City Council finds and declares that it would have adopted this ordinance notwithstanding any partial invalidity hereof.
3. In the case of conflict between this ordinance or any part hereof, and the whole or any part of any other existing ordinance of the City, the provision that establishes the higher or stricter standard shall prevail.
4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage on second reading by the City Council, ~~and shall expire automatically 12:00 p.m. on September 3, 2020.~~
